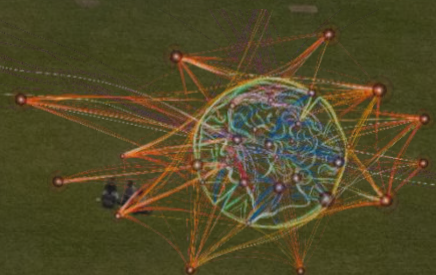

From **Toronto Pearson International Airport:**

Union Pearson (UP Express): Take the train directly to Union Station. See the [UP Express website](#) for detailed instructions and the train schedule. From Union Station take the [1 line north](#) (Yonge-University toward Vaughan Metropolitan Central Station) and get off at the Museum stop. From there it is a short walk to all venues.

From **Billy Bishop Airport:**

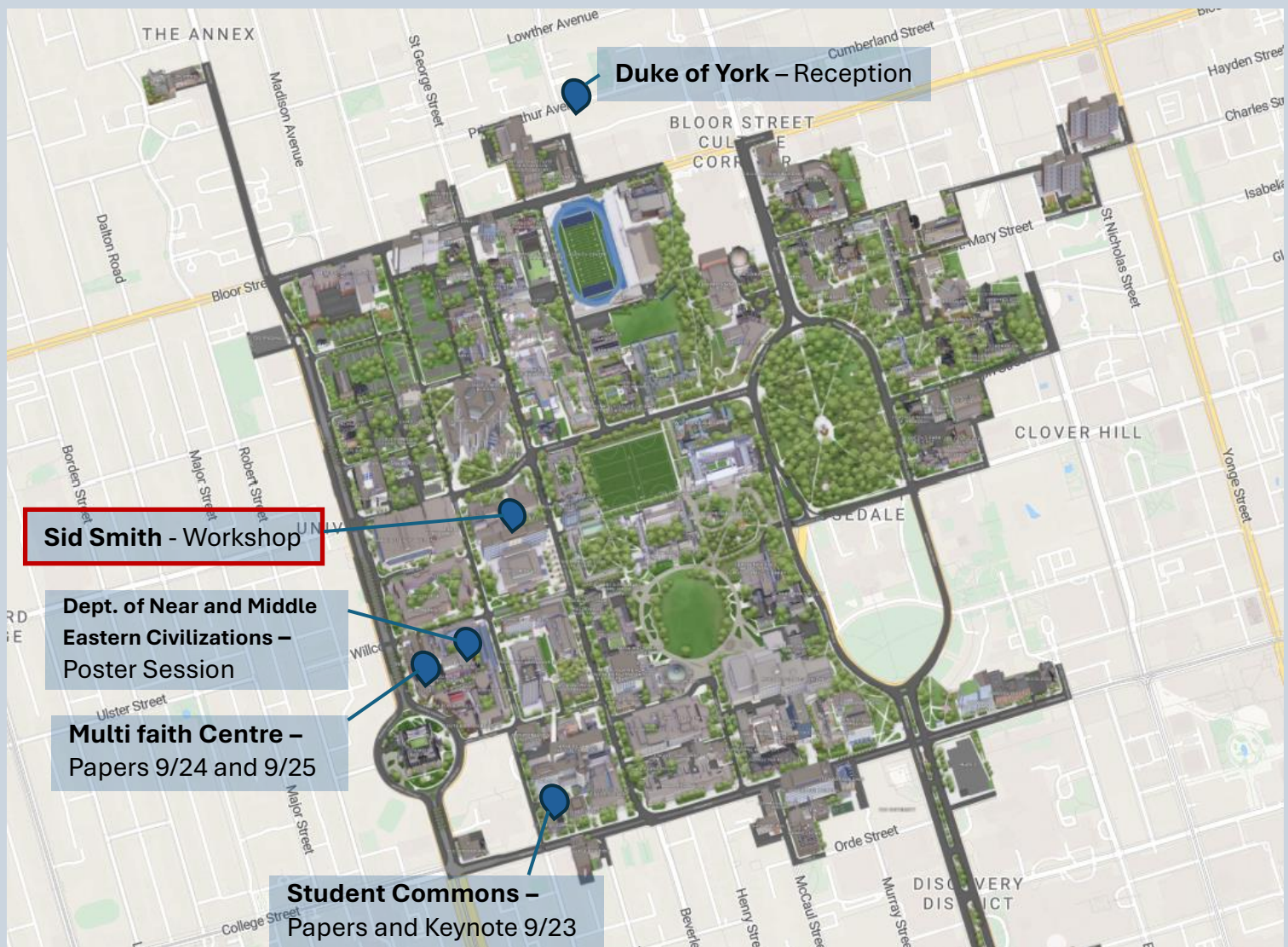
Connecting to eduroam
